MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

CREAP *Africa* Initiative emerged in response to pressing needs — to bridge the widening inequality gap, amplify marginalized voices, and drive grassroots solutions to Africa's development challenges. In an era marked by climate emergencies, democratic backsliding, and economic instability, our decision to take action was not made because we had all the answers, but because of our unwavering conviction, a clear mission, and a sense of purpose: to enhance lives by transforming the places where people live and grow.

Our work in this past year has been both ambitious and humbling. With a team of passionate professionals from diverse regions and disciplines, we launched pioneering initiatives that have already begun to shift realities in underserved communities across Nigeria.

Through our Community Dialogue programs, we have convened eleven (11) sessions with community leaders, youth, policymakers, and CSOs to drive conversations, advocacies, and actions on issues across our different thematic programs. In the Environmental Justice and Climate Actions, some notable forums were convened on themes such as:

- Climate Change Rhetorics: Challenging Active Citizenships and Actions,
- Greening the Future: Exploring Solutions for Nigeria's Environmental Challenges,
- The Petroleum Industry Act 2021 and Host Communities Relations: The Challenges, Opportunities, and Best Practices,

bringing together key stakeholders to co-create sustainable solutions to environmental crises such as flooding, deforestation, poor waste management, and PIA host community relations.

We also used the platform to promote Civic Education and Democratic Governance with carefully selected themes such as:

- Promoting Grassroot Governance Through Citizen Participation
- The Future of Anti-Corruption Efforts in Nigeria
- Rethinking Federal Identity and the Future of National Cohesion
- How Ordinary Citizens Can Win the Fight Against Injustice

Through consistent advocacy and engagements, we were able to introduce the “*Promoting Public Accountability and Democratic Rights*” forums, engaging thousands of young people in voter education, rights-based advocacy, and participatory governance workshops. We believe democracy cannot thrive without informed citizens—and we have committed to playing a key role in that civic

On **Community Development and Research programs**, we are also piloting the *Climate-Smart Agriculture and Ai for Sustainable Farming project*, empowering smallholder farmers with AI tools and training in resilient farming practices in Niger State. While we are drafting proposals to expand these initiatives, we have also begun work on *Youth Digital and Entrepreneurship Skills Acquisition program in Niger State*, targeting over 200 youths in digital literacy, entrepreneurship, and employability skills—providing a bridge to economic opportunities in a fast-changing technological world.

Health advocacy has not been left behind. Through our **Healthcare Access and Equity** efforts, we initiated the **Oral Health Initiative**, as a flagship project of CREAP Africa Initiative starting with campaigns, *that is, Oral Health in Schools (OHIS) Campaign*, reaching learners in rural areas across the FCT and six (6) states - Akwa Ibom, Plateau, Niger, Yobe, Sokoto, and Kaduna States of Nigeria, with oral hygiene kits, preventive education, dental check-ups, distribution of informative materials, among others.

Our growing **media and public engagement** efforts have amplified our work across traditional and digital platforms. From radio, television and newspaper conversations to active engagement on social media, CREAP Africa Initiative has become a visible voice in the national discourse on environmental justice, gender inclusion, and democratic governance.

Behind these efforts is a growing team and structure. To ensure effective coordination of our programs, we have structured our volunteer network across six (6) key states of Nigeria, recruited dedicated state coordinators, built strategic partnerships with organizations such as Institute for Economic and Peace, among others still counting, and laid down strong operational systems that ensure transparency, learning, and sustainability.

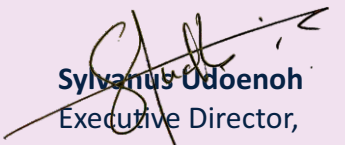
Like any young organization, we faced our fair share of challenges, from limited funding for core operations, insecurity that restricted access to certain communities, and the complexity of scaling impact with lean resources. But we do not allow these obstacles to deter us; instead, they have sharpened our vision, forced innovation, and has built the resilience that now defines our organizational DNA.

We have learned that **change begins with trust**—earned by showing up, listening deeply, and delivering results. We have learned that **collaboration multiplies impact**, and that the solutions to Africa's most urgent challenges already lie in its communities—waiting to be activated.

As we move into our second year as a registered entity, our vision remains clear: to strengthen our programs, scale our innovations, and deepen our grassroots presence. We are working to expand our Oral Health Initiative, and strengthen our Climate-Smart Agriculture and AI for Sustainable Farming project, host our first in-person Community Dialogue on peacebuilding and community leadership, and launch a fellowship program for young civic leaders. We are also investing in building CREAP *Africa* Initiative's institutional capacity—so that we not only grow, but endure.

This Annual Report does not merely mark a milestone. It is a declaration of intent, a celebration of bold beginnings, and a call to action. To everyone who has believed in us, walked with us, and invested in our dream — **THANK YOU**. We are here because of you. Let us continue this journey together. Let us keep enhancing lives—boldly, creatively, and with compassion.

OVERVIEW OF CREAP

CREAP *Africa* Initiative was incorporated in July 2024 under the Companies and Allied Matters Act, 2020 (as amended) of the Corporate Affairs Commission as **Community Rights Education Advancement Pathway Initiative**. The core mandate of CREAP is to provide platforms, tools and resources that amplify marginalized voices and promote socio-economic progress through strategic collaboration and partnership with local and international institutions, partners, and communities.

Our work focuses on research, knowledge-sharing and skills development aimed at empowering marginalized communities and advancing social rights. CREAP’s thematic services, projects, and programs are designed to address critical social and environmental issues, thereby enhancing peaceful, accountable, safe, resilient, and sustainable communities.

CREAP drives her mandate through her thematic focus in environmental justice and climate action, agriculture and food systems, healthcare access and equity, human rights and democratic governance, and community development and evidence-based research and advocacy in the underserved communities. CREAP *Africa* Initiative was founded with a vision to build a just, inclusive, and sustainable Africa where every individual, regardless of their background, has the opportunity to live a dignified and fulfilling life.

To empower marginalized communities through advocacy, knowledge-sharing, and skills development, advancing solutions to the social, economic, and environmental challenges they face.

- To empower local communities through skill development and capacity building initiative that enhances their ability to advocate for their rights and interests.

OUR THEMATIC AREAS

ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE AND CLIMATE ACTIONS

We address the pressing environmental challenges that disproportionately affects marginalized communities in Africa, particularly those vulnerable to climate change, pollution, and resource degradation.



AGRICULTURE AND FOOD SYSTEMS

With food security being a major focus, sustainable and climate-smart agricultural practices is critical to combating hunger, improving livelihoods, and economic growth. We implement tailor-made initiatives that enhance access to nutrition, contributes to women and youth entrepreneurial skills.



HEALTHCARE ACCESS AND EQUITY

CREAP is concerned about the limited access to quality healthcare and access equity in underserved communities that continues to impede Africa's social and economic progress. We make deliberate efforts through strategic partnerships in addressing these challenges through our programs and projects.



CIVIC EDUCATION AND DEMOCRATIC GOVERNANCE

For us, informed citizens and strong democratic institutions are vital for sustainable development and societal stability. This is why we dedicate our work to fostering civic engagement, lead advocacy efforts to promote an accountable, transparent and democratic society.



COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND RESEARCH

We work to drive inclusive development rooted in empirical research ensuring that our interventions are both impactful and sustainable.



2024 PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS



OVERVIEW OF ACTIVITIES UNDERTAKEN DURING THE YEAR

When the year 2024 began, we were following up with the Corporate Affairs Commission and other regulatory agencies to ensure compliance and set up of the foundation for the smooth take-off of the young organization. Initially, the organization had elected to be known as Network for Community Development Initiative (NCDI), but for our inability to secure the name, it took a significant amount of time and efforts to find a suitable name that engenders our common aspiration.

On 9th May, we were able to secure a unique name, and the organization was incorporated on 16th July 2024 as the **Community Rights Education Advancement Pathway Initiative**, which we later christened CREAP Africa Initiative. We immediately commenced action by convening a meeting where strategic pathways were discussed and reviewed by all stakeholders.

The young organization launched with a call for volunteers. Meeting of selected volunteers was convened and held at Eden Gardens, Jabi, Abuja on Friday May 31, 2024. A few volunteers joined and were assigned active roles to spearhead the growth and operations of our programs and projects. Due to prior commitments and geographic constraints, many others were not assigned active roles.

Since its incorporation in July 2024, CREAP Africa Initiative has made significant strides in designing and implementing innovative programs that respond to pressing social, environmental, and governance challenges in Nigeria. Guided by our thematic pillars, we have launched a suite of interconnected projects that emphasizes inclusivity, and sustainability. Some of the innovative programs we initiated and their impact are:



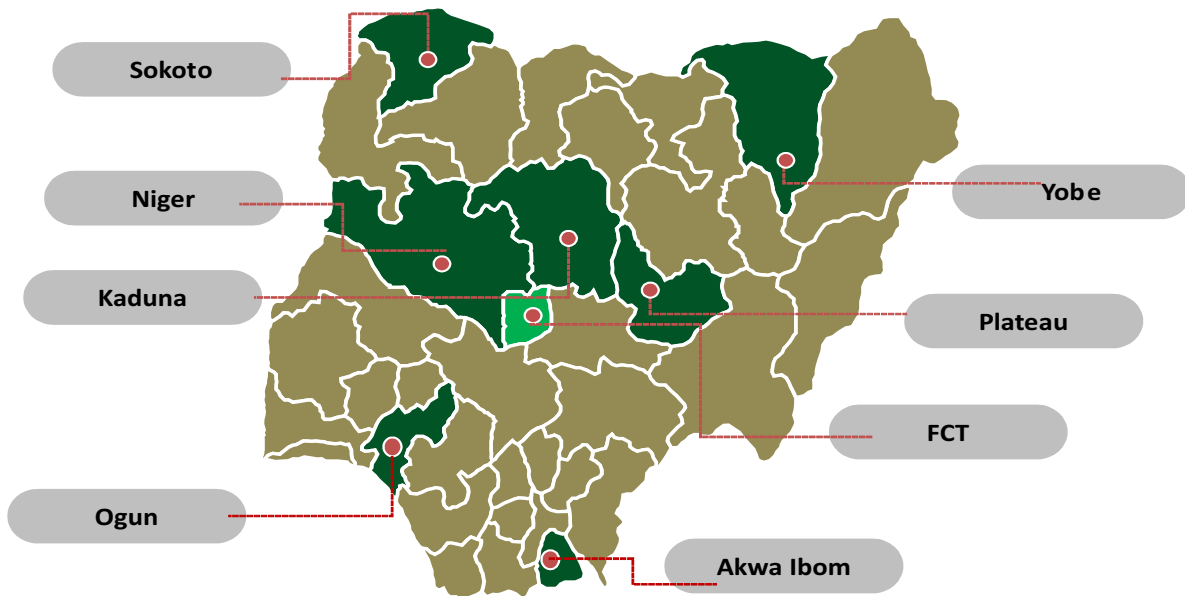


Diagram: MAP of Nigeria Showing Location of Our Project States

- **Community Dialogue Programs:**

Held eleven high-impact virtual Community Dialogue Programs under different themes, bringing together policymakers, traditional leaders, CSOs, students, and local activists to co-create solutions to pressing environmental and social challenges. The program has reached over 8,400 cumulative number of active listeners across Africa.

- **Urban Green Campaign:**

Planted over **300 trees** across flood-prone and deforested communities in Esit Eket (Akwa Ibom), and Lokoja (Kogi), while distributing tree-planting toolkits and educational materials to schools. This initiative was undertaken in June 2024 with the support and partnership of the Rotary Club of Lokoja, as part of efforts to curb the recurring environmental challenges in the communities.

- **Oral Health Campaign:**

In partnership with the FCT Education Board, we launched a pilot Oral Health project with school-based campaigns in 8 junior secondary schools, reaching over 1,000 students with oral hygiene kits, brushing demonstrations, and oral health education. The pilot phase was also implemented in Niger, Plateau, Akwa Ibom, Sokoto, Yobe, Kaduna and Ogun States are practically meant for advocacy and data collection efforts.

- **Youth Digital and Entrepreneurship Skills Acquisition Program:**

In Niger State, over **45 young people** were trained in digital skills, entrepreneurship, and job readiness. Training modules included graphic design, digital marketing, AI literacy, financial inclusion, and resume-building workshops.

- **Climate-Smart Agriculture and AI for Sustainable Farming Pilot:**

During the year, we introduced AI-enabled advisory tools for 25 smallholder farmers in Niger States, supporting early weather prediction, soil monitoring, and smart irrigation techniques through inputs and support from the Upper River Niger Basin Development Authority (URNBDA).

- **Launch of Media Platforms:**

We also launched our website and integrated social media platforms to enable effective communication and visibility of our activities and programs to external audience. We have since commenced usage of these platforms for awareness, campaigns and communications using infographics, short videos, and community stories, reaching over 5000 impressions with cumulative 467 active followers on facebook, instagram, linkedin, and twitter (X).



- **Online Campaigns:**

We launched over 33 campaigns including a 16-Days media campaigns including social media graphics, radio and television interviews, newspaper publications, and town hall meetings to raise awareness and promote activism to #EndActsofViolenceAgainstWomen&Girls across the country. We also conducted series of online media advocacy campaigns to raise awareness on climate and environmental justice issues, civic participation and democratic governance, among others.



IMPACT AND ACHIEVEMENTS

As a newly established organization, CREAP *Africa* Initiative set out to make measurable and meaningful impact through community-based programs, advocacy, and engagements. Between July 2024 and June 2025, we not only reached thousands of direct beneficiaries but also shifted mindsets, and sowed seeds of sustainability across communities.

QUANTITATIVE AND QUALITATIVE IMPACT OF 2024

The results of our first year of action have been encouraging, showing how targeted, community-led interventions can drive tangible improvements in lives, livelihoods, and learning environments.

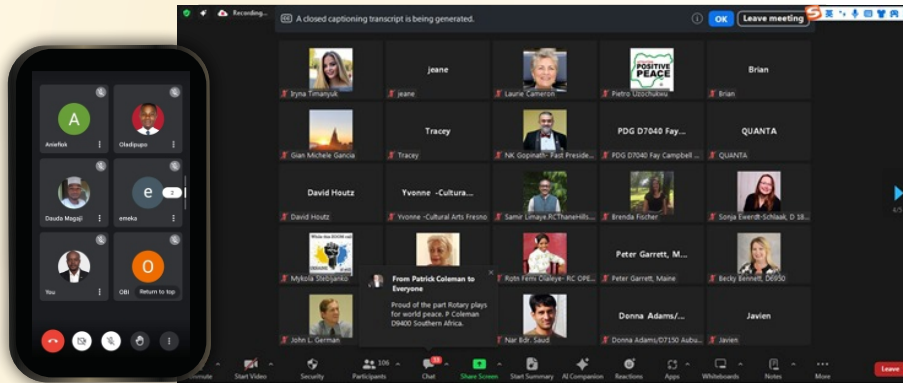
PUBLIC POLICY ENGAGEMENT

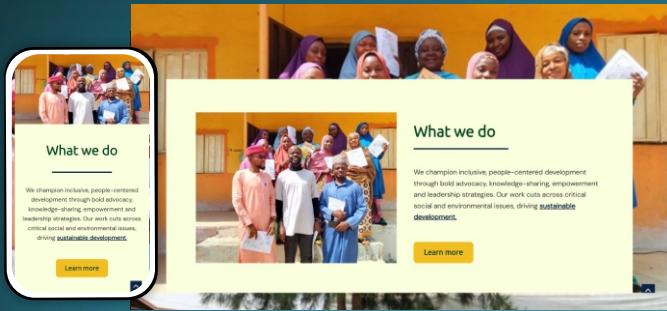

SCHOOL-BASED INTERVENTIONS

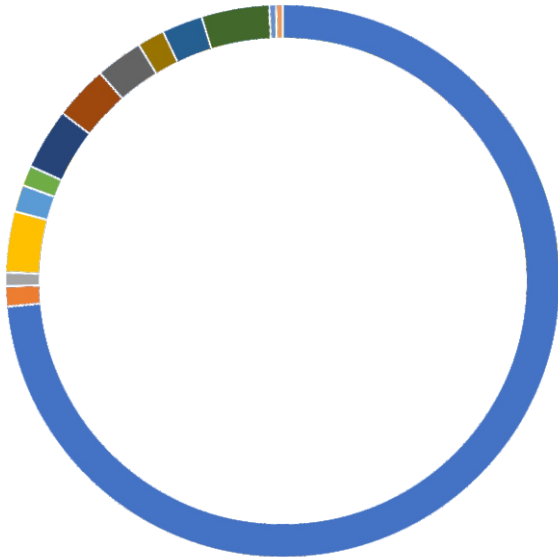

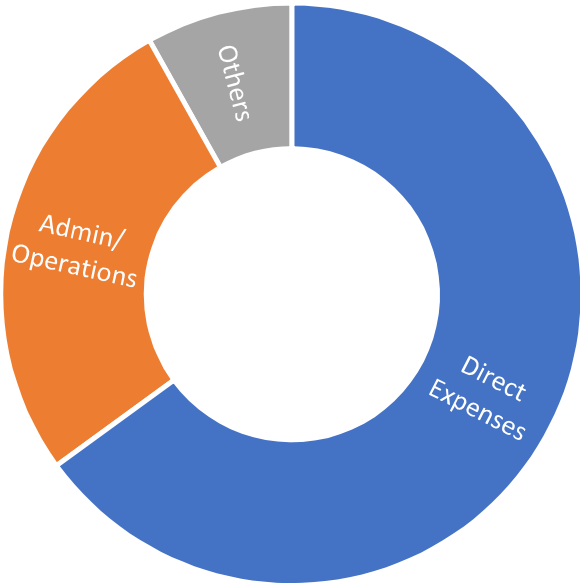
FINANCIAL REPORT
