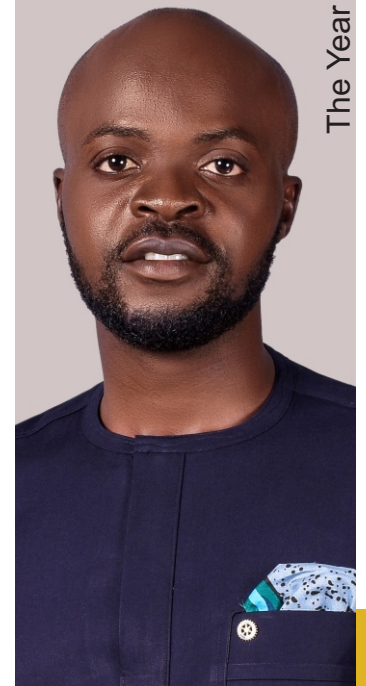
As a young organization driven by a strong commitment to social justice, community empowerment, and sustainable development, we focused our efforts on building structured, credible programs and platforms for skilled leadership, dialogue, strengthening our institutional foundations, and expanding the scope of our work across relevant development sectors.

One of our most visible contributions during the year was the restructuring of our Community Dialogue Series to an evidence-based civic platform designed to foster thoughtful conversations on pressing national issues. Through this platform, we have engaged strategic stakeholders, supported credible policies, and informed community actors on critical issues relevant to environmental sustainability, democratic governance, and community development. These efforts reinforced our belief that inclusive dialogue remains essential to shaping solutions that are both practical and people-centered.

Beyond that, the year also witnessed important steps in strengthening partnerships and institutional collaboration. Our partnership engagement efforts started with Oxfam in Nigeria, the Embassy of the United States in Abuja, French Embassy in Abuja, the Embassy of Germany in Abuja, the Nigeria Youth Future Fund, Institute for Peace and Conflict Resolution, ActionAid Nigeria, Kimpact Development Initiative, Civil Society Legislative Advocacy Centre (CISLAC), and crowned at National Orientation Agency of Nigeria, among many other CSOs, opening new avenues for cooperation around capacity building, institutional supports, strategic partnerships, joint programming. Such engagements are important for us as we seek to work alongside public institutions, civil society organizations, and development partners in advancing shared goals for Nigeria's development.

Another important milestone during the year was the continued effort to build our knowledge, strategy, research and organizational culture. We launched our official website and structured our digital platforms to support external communications and internal collaborations. Our organization leadership was strengthened and key internal policies implemented to encourage our team and volunteers to contribute ideas, research insights, and thought leadership that can inform policy discussions and community action.

We also made progress in refining the scope of our programmatic focus and completed key pilots and special intervention projects; the Oral

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Health in Schools (OHIS) Project in Abuja, Akwa Ibom and Plateau States, and the Assessment of Readiness of Smallholder Farmers for Climate-Smart Agriculture and Artificial Intelligence for Sustainable Food Systems in Niger State. The initial intervention in Youth Skills and Digital Future in Minna, Niger State was reported and submitted.

In the year in review, we held a few special projects: the **Virtual Peacebuilding Workshop**, Series of Activities to mark the **2025 16-Days of Activism to Eliminate Acts of Violence Against Women and Girls**, and a week-long program in commemoration of the **2025 International Day of Peace** in partnership with the Institute of Peace and Conflict Resolution, Abuja, and we are steadily building a portfolio of programs designed to respond to the real needs of communities.

Importantly, this year reaffirmed the power of young people working together across diverse backgrounds. Our volunteers, team members, and partners continue to demonstrate that collective effort and shared vision can drive meaningful change, even with limited resources. This is why we launched the **Youth Climate Adaptation Programme (YCAP)**, a structured cohort promoting youth leadership in resilience against impact of climate change, and the **Community Peace Champions Initiative (CPCI)**, another youth civic engagement and peacebuilding intervention.

During the period in review, we made remarkable contributions and visible engagement in important public policy forums, and contributed to issues of public importance. These include series of advocacy meetings, convening, recommendations and attendance in legislative public hearings on Electoral Reforms, Tax Reforms, Proceeds of Crimes Recovery and Management Amendment Bill, NYSC Reforms, Youth Policy Reviews, and Disability Act amendments, among others.

While we celebrate the progress recorded, we are also mindful that the work ahead remains significant. The social, environmental and governance challenges bedeviling our communities require sustained commitment, innovation, and collaboration, and that is why we need your continued support to getting this on track. As we move forward, CREAP Africa Initiative remains committed to strengthening its programs, deepening partnerships, and expanding opportunities for citizens; especially young people, to participate actively in shaping their future.

I extend my sincere appreciation to our volunteers, team members, and partners whose dedication and support continues to move this organization forward. Your trust, energy, and belief in our mission are the driving force behind the momentum we are building. We look ahead with renewed determination to scale our impact and contribute meaningfully to building resilient communities, a more just and sustainable society. OVERVIEW OF CREAP

CREAP Africa Initiative (registered as **Community Rights Education Advancement Pathway Initiative**) is a nonprofit organization committed to empowering marginalized and underserved communities through people-centered, and sustainable development solutions. The organization works to address structural inequalities and unlock opportunities by creating pathways that enable communities to access information, resources, and decision-making spaces that improves their overall well-being.

CREAP collaborates with local, national and international institutions to design and implement programs that promote advocacy, knowledge-sharing, skills development, leadership strategies, and civic participation. Our work strengthens local capacities, expands equitable access to opportunities, and supports skill acquisition initiatives that uplift vulnerable populations. Through diverse but structured interventions across our thematic, CREAP addresses critical social and environmental challenges, supporting communities become more peaceful, accountable, resilient, and sustainable.

Established in October 2021 and formally registered in July 2024 under the Companies and Allied Matters Act, 2020 (As Amended) of the Corporate Affairs Commission, CREAP Africa Initiative operates as a recognized nonprofit organization in the Nigeria CSO ecosystem. The organization champions innovative platforms, tools, and community-driven approaches that advance bold advocacy, empowerment, and leadership strategies across Africa.

CREAP's thematic focus areas are; Peacebuilding and Democratic Governance, Climate Change and Sustainability, and Youth Empowerment and Inclusive Development. Across these themes, CREAP ensures that vulnerable groups, especially women, youth, PLWDs, and rural communities, are meaningfully engaged, protected, and empowered to shape development outcomes.

HIGHLIGHTS OF 2025 ACTIVITIES



INSTITUTIONAL STRENGTHENING AND ORGANIZATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

In 2025, a significant part of our work focused on strengthening the institutional foundation of CREAP Africa Initiative to ensure that our programs are supported by strong governance, effective systems, and improved visibility. As a growing organization, we recognized that sustainable impact requires not only meaningful projects in communities but also a resilient and well-structured institution capable of delivering them effectively.

During the year, we made deliberate efforts to refine our external communications and public visibility. This included strengthening our digital presence through the launch and continuous development of our official website, as well as improving engagement across our social media and other communication platforms. These efforts have helped position the organization more clearly within the social development ecosystem and provided a platform for sharing our work, research, and community impact with a broader audience.

A major governance milestone was the formation of our Board of Trustees, which provides strategic oversight, guidance, and institutional credibility to the organization. The new board is composed of experienced and accountable professional and personalities: **Barr. Peter Ime Akpan, Barr. Mojisola Tijani, Amb. Enakeme Ojineme, Ms Imaobong Udofia, Dr Aliyu B. Ali, Hon. Almustapha Emem Edoho, Mr Sylvanus**

Udoenoh as the members of the board. marking an important step toward strengthening the leadership structures and ensuring long-term accountability and transparency.

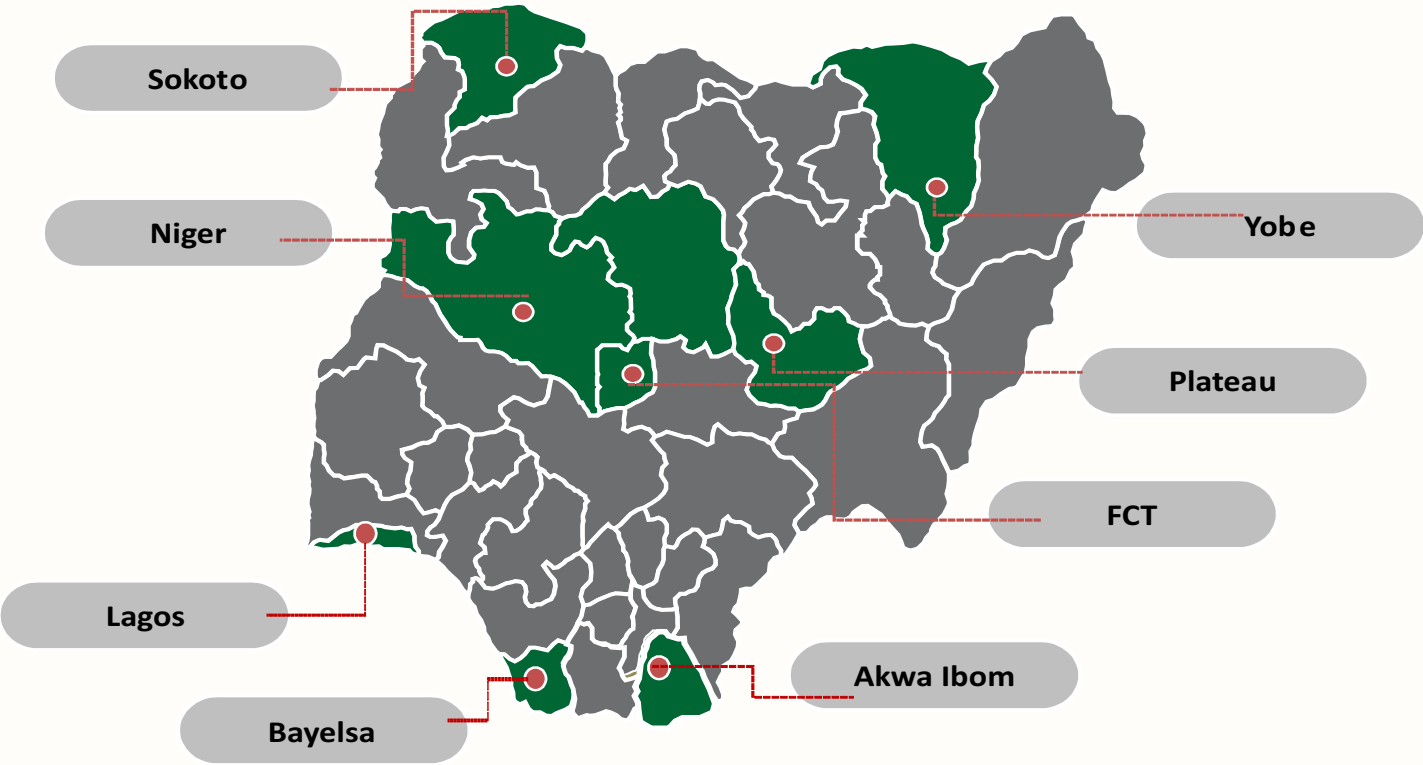
We also made progress in improving the efficiency of our financial management and accountability systems through the opening of official domiciliary bank accounts with Stanbic IBTC Plc and Fidelity Bank Plc, and appointed competent persons to the finance unit. This aimed to support responsible resource management, strengthen donor confidence, and ensure that all programs are delivered with integrity and accountability.

In addition, the organization invested time in developing key policy and governance documents to guide our operations. These policies which include - Financial Management Policy, Procurement Policy, Anti-Fraud and Corruption Policy, Safeguarding and Child Protection Policy, Gender and Inclusion Policy, Monitoring and Evaluation Policy, Data Protection and Privacy Policy, Risk Management Policy, Volunteer and HR Management Policy, and Communications and Branding Policy - provide clear frameworks for decision-making, internal coordination, ethical conduct, and program implementation, helping to consistency and professionalism across our activities.

Another important achievement during the year was the strengthening of our subnational structures and programming teams. Our state teams in Akwa Ibom, Plateau, and the Federal Capital Territory (FCT) were further organized and supported to improve coordination, local engagement, and program delivery within their respective communities. This step has helped expand the organization's operational reach while ensuring that programs remain responsive to local realities.

Overall, these institutional strengthening efforts have laid a stronger foundation for growth, enabling CREAP Africa Initiative to operate more efficiently, build stronger partnerships, and deliver greater impact in the years ahead.

Impact Reports From 2025 Programs & Initiatives

EVIDENCE-BASED COMMUNITY DIALOGUE SERIES

The Evidence-Based Community Dialogue Series provide a structured platform for citizen engagement on salient national development issues. The program convenes community stakeholders, policymakers, young professionals, civil society actors, and experts to delve on pressing social, environmental and national security issues. Since its inception, this initiative has continued to shape public conversation by creating space for inclusive dialogue, advocacy and citizen participation in policy, development priorities, and community-driven solutions. Outputs from this forum are documented on various policy briefs, letters, and publications.

In 2025, more than 12 sessions were convened online and in-person, bringing participants to delve on trending, topical and policy issues affecting the Nigeria's social and environmental landscape. Both virtual and in-person engagements on this platform has provided civic awareness, open conversation, and engagement for thousands of young civic actors and policymakers on issues, driving advocacy for growth, and education.

ORAL HEALTH IN SCHOOLS (OHIS) PROJECT

The Oral Health in Schools Project is a special public health intervention of CREAP Africa Initiative, piloted in Abuja, Akwa Ibom State, and Plateau State. The project aimed to improve awareness of oral hygiene and preventive dental care among school children. Through school-based engagements, students received education on oral health practices and the importance of preventive care for over nine (9) months.

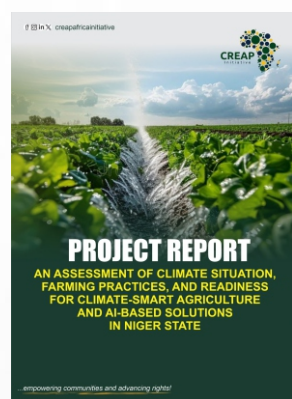


Research on ‘**ASSESSMENT OF CLIMATE SITUATION, FARMING PRACTICES AND READINESS OF SMALLHOLDER FARMERS FOR CLIMATE-SMART AGRICULTURE AND ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE-BASED SOLUTIONS**’ was carried out in Niger State between July and September 2025. This initiative assessed the preparedness of smallholder farmers in Niger State to adopt climate-smart agricultural practices and emerging technologies, including artificial intelligence applications in agriculture. The assessment, which took place in Pyata and Basa communities of Bosso and Bida Local Government Areas as part of our effort in advancing CSA & AI-based solutions for sustainable food production, aimed to inform future programming in sustainable agriculture, climate resilience, and technology-driven food systems. The CSA-AI-based solution is implemented in phases.

INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PEACE 2025



To commemorate the International Day of Peace 2025, CREAP Africa Initiative in partnership with the Institute for Peace and Conflict Resolution, and other partners in Abuja, organized a week-long peace programme . The programme focused on peace education, civic dialogue, awareness creation, and community engagement around coexistence. The program featured visitation to Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) Camp in Durumi, Abuja, Peace Walk from UN House to IPCR, Series of media engagements and podcast programs including World Press Conference, peace and mental health screening session, commemorative football and religious services at the National Mosque, and All Saints Cathedral, Wuse, Abuja, Commemorative Webinar, a Public Lecture chaired by former Minister of Integration, Prof Jerry Gana, Award/ Gala Night, and a symbolic dove release ceremony hosted by the Embassy of Germany in Abuja, Nigeria.

VIRTUAL PEACEBUILDING WORKSHOP 2025

The Virtual Workshop 2025 themed, “Promoting Peace and Security in the Face of Emerging Global Threats”, convened experts, policymakers, youth leaders, media practitioners, faith actors, and civil society stakeholders across different parts of Africa to examine emerging security challenges in Nigeria. Discussions highlighted the interconnected impact of cyber threats, misinformation, climate change, violent extremism, and governance gaps. Participants emphasized community resilience, youth engagement, media integrity, faith-based peacebuilding strategies, and multi-sector collaboration, culminating in actionable recommendations and roadmap for strengthening national peace, security, and citizen-led resilience interventions.

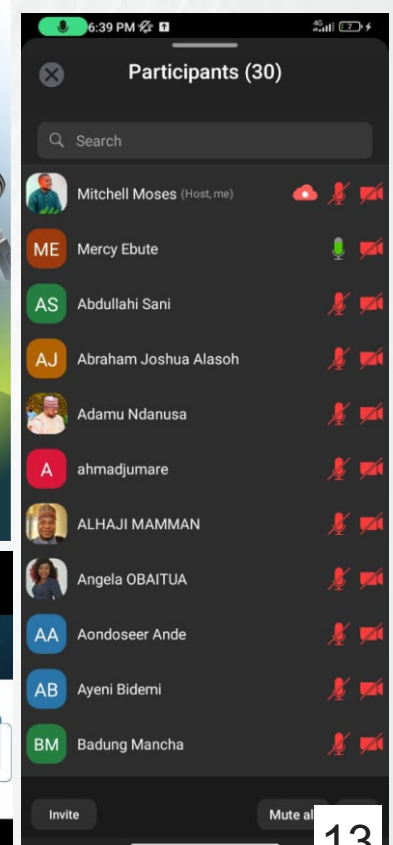
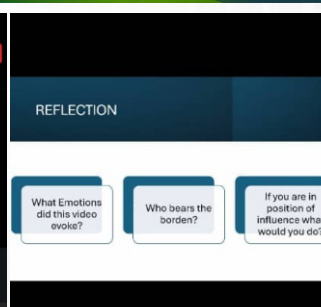
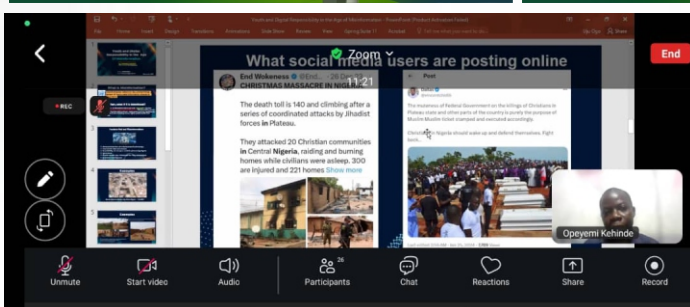

16-DAYS OF ACTIVISM 2025

The 2025 16 Days of Activism Campaign implemented by CREAP Africa Initiative under the theme “*Unite to End Digital Violence Against Women and Girls*”, successfully raised awareness on technology-facilitated gender-based violence through radio advocacy, media publications, special commemorative webinar, digital campaigns, participation in national dialogues, and community-based sensitization. Working with partners including Institute for Peace and Conflict Resolution, Abuja, government agencies, development partners, the media, the campaign strengthened public understanding of online safety, promoted survivor-centered advocacy, fostered strategic partnerships, and advanced collective action for safer digital spaces for women and girls.

PUBLIC POLICY ADVOCACY AND CONTRIBUTION TO NATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

In the period under review, CREAP Africa Initiative maintained an active presence in policy discussions and national conversations on governance, development, peacebuilding, and citizen participation. The organization convened, contributed to and participated in a wide range of policy dialogues, consultations, conferences, and stakeholder engagements, including: Discussions around the Electoral Acts 2026; Consultations on the Tax Reforms Act 2025; Conversation on Nigeria's emerging Solar Power Revolution organized by GIFSEP; Interfaith Mediation and Dialogue Initiatives hosted by Interfaith Mediation Centre, Kaduna and Institute for Peace and Conflict Resolution, Abuja; Youth Engagements session with the UN Assistant Secretary General on Youth Engagement hosted by the UNDP in Abuja; Briefing and Negotiators Training

for COP30 organized by National Council on Climate Change and PACE; NYSC Reforms Dialogue organized by the Federal Ministry of Youth Development; Multi-Stakeholder Dialogue on Poverty Reduction Strategies in Nigeria organized by ActionAid Nigeria and the Federal Ministry of Budget and Economic Planning; Commemorative events to mark the United Nations at 80; Akwa Ibom State Youth Policy Roundtable organized by the Akwa Ibom State Ministry of Youth Development and Civil Society Organizations in Uyo; Other national and subnational policy engagements focused on governance, civic participation, climate action, peacebuilding, and youth inclusion. These platforms enabled the organization to contribute perspectives from young people and communities, while also strengthening its role as credible voice in public policy and social development discourse.



YOUTH CLIMATE ADAPTATION PROGRAMME (YCAP)

The Youth Climate Adaptation Programme (YCAP) was officially launched as a structured youth leadership initiative focused on climate adaptation, environmental awareness and community resilience. The program aims to equip young leaders with the knowledge and skills required to support climate action at the community level. This commencement intervention, which was supported by ActionAid Nigeria, reached 25 climate champions with knowledge of climate change, practical skills, and engagement projects. The is now adopted as our flagship intervention program and hoping to expand to include specialized trainings and empowerment across many Nigerian communities.

ADVOCACY FOR THE AMENDMENT OF THE PROCEEDS OF CRIMES RECOVERY AND MANAGEMENT ACT

In the 2025 program year, CREAP Africa Initiative expanded its civic engagement efforts through active advocacy and participation in legislative and policy reform processes. One of the organization’s notable contribution was its advocacy for the Amendment of the **Proceeds of Crimes Recovery and Management Act**, aimed at strengthening transparency, accountability, and effective management of recovered public assets in Nigeria. Through policy engagement, stakeholder consultations, media advocacy, letters, recommendations, participation in public hearings, and convening of offline and online meetings, the organization contributed to conversations on improving governance frameworks and ensuring that public resources are managed in a manner that benefits citizens. We are glad to share that the bill was passed by the Nigerian Senate on 9th July 2026, and our next advocacy continues at the House of Representatives..

YOUTH SKILLS AND DIGITAL FUTURE INITIATIVE (YSDFI)

In early 2024, CREAP Africa Initiative initiated the YSDF Initiative, and the project was successfully implemented in Minna, Niger State, equipping 45 young people with practical digital and computer skills for today's and tomorrow's workforce. Over three months, participants received hands-on training in digital literacy, productivity tools, entrepreneurship, and career readiness, supported by mentorship and practical assignments. The initiative strengthened participants' confidence, employability, and awareness of digital income opportunities while demonstrating the effectiveness of community-based digital skills training. The project's success established a scalable model for expanding future-ready skills development to underserved communities across Nigeria.

This, the organization pursued funding opportunities through competitive grant applications while actively engaging development partners, diplomatic missions, government institutions, and civil society organizations to expand its impact and collaborative reach. Strategic engagements with organizations such as Oxfam in Nigeria, ActionAid Nigeria, the National

Nigeria, ActionAid Nigeria, the National Orientation Agency, the Institute for Peace and Conflict Resolution, Kimpact Development Initiative, and Civil Society Legislative Advocacy Centre, among other partners created opportunities for technical collaboration, institutional strengthening, joint programming, and policy engagement. These efforts enhanced CREAP's visibility, credibility, and readiness to implement larger, community-driven interventions across its thematic areas.
